
What is propaganda?

Propaganda was a form of media commonly used during World War II to influence individuals and communities to think and act a certain way. In Nazi Germany, propaganda was often used to spread fear and misinformation to promote Hitler's biased and harmful ideologies. In the United States, however, propaganda was often used in a positive manner to encourage individuals and communities to contribute to the war effort in any way that they could, whether it be by planting a Victory garden, buying war stamps/bonds, or gathering scrap materials to donate.

During WWII, propaganda was presented to the public in a variety of forms, including short films, radio advertisements, and posters.




